COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

BIB110 Old Testament Literature (3) A course that has as its primary content the Old Testament, stressing the major features of each book and emphasizing the practical value for our modern context. Special attention is also given to analyzing the literary and theology characteristics of the text, as well as the theology, chronology, archeology, and historical background of each book.

BIB220 Biblical Exegesis (3) Prerequisite: BIB110, BIB120; This course introduces the principles and methods by which a faithful meaning of the Scriptures may be obtained. Its primary focus, but is not limited, to New Testament interpretation. This course also introduces the student to both essential research tools such as critical commentaries, dictionaries, lexicons, and serves as a foundational course for biblical preaching and teaching.

BIB233 Act (3) Prerequisite: BIB110, BIB120, BIB220, THE124; An analytical study of the book of Acts in relation to the purpose, structure and history of the New Testament church. Special emphasis is placed on the ministry of the Holy Spirit and the missionary journeys of Paul.

THE103 Introduction to Systematic Theology (3) This course introduces the student to systematic Christian doctrine as expressed through the perspective of the larger evangelical tradition. This includes an in-depth study of the methodology, Bibliology, Theology proper, Christology, Pneumatology, Soteriology, Ecclesiology, and Eschatology. Special emphasis is placed on the articulation of theology for our modern context.

THE242 Eschatology (3) Prerequisite: THE103, THE124; A theological study of end-times from a Pentecostal perspective. Topics covered in this class include studies such as the signs of the times, Rapture, heaven and hell, judgment, creation, plus various views of the Tribulation and the Millennium. Selected passages from the Old and New Testament and historical theological views are incorporated in this course.

MIN110 Practicum I: Spiritual Gifts in Ministry (1) Practicum courses are designed to serve as an opportunity to learn the essentials of ministry, integrate academic learning with practical ministry experience, discern one's call, and learn the liturgical practices of the church. Students are required to put in practice their learnings by serving in a church, ministry, or organization. Topics covered in this course include: spiritual gifts and their classifications, servant profiles, personal style, and passion ministry categories.

MIN130 Practicum III: Ministry Ordinances and Rites (1) Practicum courses are designed to serve as an opportunity to learn the essentials of ministry and integrate academic learning with practical ministry experience. Students are required to put in practice their learnings by serving in a church, ministry, or organization. Practicum III focuses on learning how to implement the ordinances and rites of the church. Topics covered in this course include: How to baptize, marry, bury, administer Communion, altar prayer, laying on hands, praying for the sick, healing, and deliverance.

MIN256 Conflict Management and Church Leadership (3) A study in the methods and solutions to conflict resolution. The student is informed in the practical approaches to dealing with ministerial and parish conflict from a Christian and leadership perspective.

MIN300 Mission and Culture (3) This interdisciplinary study, integrating theology and praxis, seeks to develop a theology of mission based on the premise that the unifying theme of Scripture is embodied in the concept of the Kingdom of God introduced in the Old Testament, fulfilled in the ministry of Jesus Christ in the New Testament, and demonstrated to the world through the life and actions of a believing community empowered by the Holy Spirit.

ENG126 Persuasive Writing (3) Students will focus on the conventions of academic writing with particular attention to persuasive writing. The purpose of this course is to help students write convincing, well-developed, and well-organized essays that synthesize, document, and respond to various sources, arguments, and positions on a given topic.

HIS202 Church History (3) A survey of the major theological controversies, persons, and writings of church history from the New Testament to the Reformation.

SPE106 Public Speaking (3) AThis introductory course is designed to prepare students to be effective oral communicators in all aspects of public presentations including design and delivery of the public speech. The course is appropriate for all students interested in developing their public speaking knowledge and skills.



BUS120 Computer Application of Business (3) The theory and practice of the major uses of computers in business. Particular emphasis on hands-on experience with word processing, spreadsheets, database management, and presentation graphics. Discussion of the evaluative process in selecting both software, hardware, and peripheral products.

BUS122 Quantitative Business Methods (3) Provides the student with experience in the mathematical applications unique to the business worlds of retailing, banking, and finance.

ECO210 Macroeconomics (3) An introduction to the principles of economic analysis, economic institutions, and the issues of public policy. Includes analysis of the national economy, money and credit, income, employment, prices, and monetary and fiscal policies.

PSY210 Child Growth and Development (3) Prerequisite: PSY101; This course presents the study of human development from conception through adolescence. Special emphasis is placed upon the theory and application of the principles of cognitive and moral development, social and emotional development, and physical development. Additionally, students will examine individual differences and other variables such as ethnicity and culture as they impact development during the formative years.

PSY250 History and Systems of Psychology (3) Prerequisite: PSY101; This course centers on an analysis of antecedents of modern psychology and their relevance to major contemporary systematic positions. Emphasis is placed upon philosophy of science, associationism, structuralism, functionalism, behaviorism, gestalt, psycho-analysis, and recent psychological theories, including existentialism.

CERTIFICATE in MINISTERIAL STUDIES COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

MIN170 Spirit Empowered Church (1 unit)

This course is based on Acts 2 and focuses on developing Spirit-empowered disciples who will be involved in five functions found there: connect, grow, serve, go, and worship.

MIN181 Ministry Practicum (1 unit)

Practicum courses are designed to provide an opportunity to learn the essentials of ministry, integrate academic learning with practical ministry experience, discern one's call, and learn the liturgical practices of the church. Students will reflect on their practical ministerial experience both inside and outside the Church. This course focuses on learning how to implement the sacred rites of the church. Topics covered in this course include: How to baptize, marry, bury, administer Communion, praying for the sick, healing, and deliverance.

MIN203 Ministerial Ethics (1 unit)

This course is a study of the development of the moral aspects of the Christian leader's life. It involves considerations of personal integrity and the application of Christian ethics to the life and behavior of a believer and minister. Special consideration is given to the implications of the "fruit of the Spirit" to one's life and relationships.

THE126 Assemblies of God History, Mission, and Governance (1 unit)

This course will cover the history, doctrine and governance of the Assemblies of God. Attention is given to the General Council Constitution and Bylaws in relation to credentialed ministers, district councils, and local churches.

THE220 Introduction to Pentecostal Theology (1 unit)

An introduction on the foundation of Pentecostalism, its history, and distinguishing theology of the Spirit.

THE222 Theology I (1 unit)

A study of the methodology and content of systematic theology. Theology proper, anthropology, and bibliology are examined in this course.
