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COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

BIB110 Old Testament Literature (3) A course that has as its primary content the Old Testament, stressing the major features of each book and emphasizing the practical value for our modern context. Special attention is also given to analyzing the literary and theology characteristics of the text, as well as the theology, chronology, archeology, and historical background of each book.

BIB220 Biblical Exegesis (3) Prerequisite: BIB110, BIB120; This course introduces the principles and methods by which a faithful meaning of the Scriptures may be obtained. Its primary focus, but is not limited, to New Testament interpretation. This course also introduces the student to both essential research tools such as critical commentaries, dictionaries, lexicons, and serves as a foundational course for biblical preaching and teaching.

BIB315 Job (3) Prerequisite: BIB110, BIB120, BIB220; A literary study of the Hebrew Poetic book, Job, with an emphasis on understanding the literary structure, themes, and applications. This course covers the historical background, theological themes, and ministerial application of various topics such as suffering, death, and wisdom.

THE103 Introduction to Systematic Theology (3) This course introduces the student to systematic Christian doctrine as expressed through the perspective of the larger evangelical tradition. This includes an in-depth study of the methodology, Bibliology, Theology proper, Christology, Pneumatology, Soteriology, Ecclesiology, and Eschatology. Special emphasis is placed on the articulation of theology for our modern context.

THE182 Comparative Religions (3) Prerequisite: THE103, THE124, THE256; A study of the origins, fundamental principles, and holy writings of the various religions and cults of the world. The course will provide the student with an introductory understanding of the various religious views and customs of various beliefs.

MIN115 Spiritual Disciplines (3) A study of the biblical and theological foundations of spiritual formation. The course seeks to establish a sound theological framework for a functioning spirituality within the Pentecostal tradition. Such topics as prayer, worship community, and other such disciplines will be considered.

MIN120 Practicum II: Personal Ministerial Development (1) Topics covered for this course include the spiritual practices, developing personal character and integrity as a minister, dealing with people in ministry through conflict management and problem-solving skills, and the professional responsibilities of the minister with family life, social life, and spiritual life.

MIN224 Spiritual Care and Healing (3) This course is designed to give the student an opportunity to discover the vital link between spiritual care and inner healing. The student will acquire the skill to minister to the needs of the people seeking help for deep spiritual problems and articulate the teachings and practices of the Pentecostal movement in the area of spiritual warfare and deliverance.

COL101 College Success (3) This course equips students with the foundational knowledge, skills, and dispositions needed to thrive in a Christian higher education environment. Emphasis is placed on academic preparedness, self-management, communication, critical thinking, spiritual formation, and the integration of faith and learning. Students will engage in activities and reflections designed to strengthen their academic confidence, clarify educational and vocational goals, and promote responsible participation in the life of the college.

COM220 Writing Composition (3) This course introduces students to the principles and practice of college-level writing. Students will develop the competencies necessary to write coherent, cohesive, and appropriate texts for academic and professional contexts. Emphasis will be placed on the writing process, organization of ideas, grammar, punctuation, style, revision, and clarity. Upon completion of the course, students will be able to plan, draft, revise, and edit expository, argumentative, and narrative texts with increasing effectiveness.

HIS165 U.S. History (3) This course is a survey of major political, economic, social, diplomatic, and intellectual trends and events in United States history from the pre-colonial period to the present. Attention is given to the collision and creation of cultures during colonization, the development of slavery, the American Revolution and national origins, the growth and division of the nation before the Civil War, the building of the modern industrial society, growing involvement in international relations, the evolution of a multi-ethnic community, and social reform movements of the 20th and 21st



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centuries.

MNG110 Principles of Management (3) Discusses the development of an integrated concept of principles of management which have general applicability to all types of organizations. A study of principles involved in the functions of planning, organizing, staffing, directing and controlling an organization. An introduction to basic management philosophy and the decision-making process. *(online only)*

BUS111 Introduction to Business (3) A basic survey of the scope, function, and organization of contemporary business with an emphasis on the careers available within the world of business. This course will be of interest to both business majors and other students. *(online only)*

BUS417 Business and Faith (3) Prerequisite: BUS111; This course explores the relationship between Christian faith and contemporary business practice. Students examine how biblical principles, Christian vocation, stewardship, ethical leadership, and personal character shape decision making in business organizations and the marketplace. The course considers the moral, social, and spiritual dimensions of work, leadership, entrepreneurship, finance, human relations, and organizational responsibility in a global context. Students will integrate business knowledge with a Christian worldview in order to lead with competence, integrity, and faithfulness in professional settings. *(online only)*

BUS424 Corporate Finance (3) Prerequisites: BUS111, BUS122, ACC220; A study of basic principles and theories of business finance, including cash flow analysis, working capital management, capital budgeting, investment activities, credit management, mergers, acquisitions, reorganizations, and liquidations. Includes discussion of financial principles and practices related to business corporations, identifying methods, instruments, control factors in raising, administering, distributing funds and the sources and uses of financial information. *(online only)*

PSY101 Introduction to Psychology (3) An introduction to the fundamental concepts of psychology which includes human behavior, learning, motivation and emotion, personality, and the application of psychological principles for a ministerial setting.

PSY200 Introduction to Psychopharmacology (3) Prerequisite: PSY101; This course extends the study of brain chemistry into the topic of drugs and the chemical treatment of emotional and behavior disorders. This course provides an overview of drugs and biological interventions commonly used in clinical practice, their underlying brain mechanisms, and the research to support their effectiveness.

PSY323 Integration of Psychology and Theology (3) Prerequisite: PSY101; A study of contemporary efforts to develop a psychology consistent with Christian values, focusing on the value of integrative efforts to both the theory and practice of psychology and theology. Discussion includes matters of behavior, cognition, emotion, and motivation. *(online only)*

CERTIFICATE in MINISTERIAL STUDIES COURSE DESCRIPTIONS *(online only)*

MIN181 Ministry Practicum (1 unit)

Practicum courses are designed to provide an opportunity to learn the essentials of ministry, integrate academic learning with practical ministry experience, discern one's call, and learn the liturgical practices of the church. Students will reflect on their practical ministerial experience both inside and outside the Church. This course focuses on learning how to implement the sacred rites of the church. Topics covered in this course include: How to baptize, marry, bury, administer Communion, praying for the sick, healing, and deliverance.

MIN203 Ministerial Ethics (2 units)

This course is a study of the development of the moral aspects of the Christian leader's life. It involves considerations of personal integrity and the application of Christian ethics to the life and behavior of a believer and minister. Special consideration is given to the implications of the "fruit of the Spirit" to one's life and relationships.
