BIB120 New Testament Literature (3) A survey of New Testament literature stressing the major features and genre of each book. Special attention is also given to the theology, historical context, and background of each book.

BIB201 Psalms (3) Prerequisite: BIB110, BIB120, BIB220; The course will combine a study of some of the broader issues of the Book of Psalms such as the history of interpretation, the Hebrew poetry, the Psalter as a collection, and the use of the Psalms in worship with exegetical study of individual psalms. **BIB235 Prison Epistles** (3) Prerequisite: BIB110, BIB120, BIB220; An analysis of Paul's epistles to the Churches: Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, and Philemon. Emphasis is placed on interpreting the biblical genre, the historical circumstances, theology, and application for our modern context.

<u>THE256 Theological Ethics for Christian Leaders</u> (3) This course is a study of ethics from a theological and biblical perspective. It provides the foundation for ethical analysis of modern and moral challenges at the personal and public level of life. Topics covered include the study of virtue, deontology, teleology and utilitarianism.

THE124 Pentecostal Theology (3) This course introduces the student on the tenets of the Assemblies of God. Emphasis is placed on the foundation of Pentecostalism, an examination of the four cardinal doctrines of the Assemblies of God such as the role and work of the Spirit in relation to baptism, salvation, healing, and the second coming of Christ.

THE330 Christology (3) Prerequisite: THE103, THE124; A biblical, historical, and theological exploration of the person and work of Christ, with special reference to the practical implications of this doctrine for the disciple-making mission of the church.

MIN120 Practicum II: Personal Ministerial Development (1) Topics covered in this course include: Character, integrity, accountability, conflict management, problem solving, professionalism in social media, the personal life of a minister, the influence of a minister, the responsibility of a minister, reproducing ministers, insights from Paul and other biblical examples.

MIN156 Effective Leadership (3) This course introduces the various styles and methods of leadership. Special attention is given to the leader's spiritual life, role within the context of ministry, and biblical examples of leadership.

HIS180 Latinos in US History (3) The student will be introduced to the history of Latino/a people and its diversity of culture, social, economic and political situation in the United States. This class will include discussions on prominent figures in Latino/a US History and explore the challenges of Latino/a as a minority group.

MAT163 Math and Personal Financial Management (3) An introduction to algebra for financial arithmetic and an introduction to consumer math that will aid the student's financial life. Topics included within this course are accounting principles, taxing, simple and compound interest, investments, and credit cards. PSY101 Introduction to Psychology (3) An introduction to the fundamental concepts of psychology which includes human behavior, learning, motivation and emotion, personality, and the application of psychological principles for a ministerial setting.

BUS111 Introduction to Business (3) A basic survey of the scope, function, and organization of contemporary business with an emphasis on the careers available within the world of business. This course will be of interest to both business majors and other students.

<u>MGN110 Principles of Management</u> (3) Discusses the development of an integrated concept of principles of management which have general applicability to all types of organizations. A study of principles involved in the functions of planning, organizing, staffing, directing and controlling an organization. An introduction to basic management philosophy and the decision-making process.

PSY200 Introduction to Psychopharmacology (3) Prerequisite: PSY101; The course will provide students with an introduction to psychopharmacology, summarizing the basic concepts of the functions of the organs and systems of the human body and brain. The course incorporates an overview of drugs, their action, effects, use and abuse. Students will identify and assess the actions, effects, uses and abuses of legal and illegal drugs. The course will also review the practical aspects of understanding pharmaceuticals for Christian leaders.

PSY250 History and Systems of Psychology (3) Prerequisite: PSY101; This course centers on an analysis of antecedents of modern psychology and their relevance to major contemporary systematic positions. Emphasis is placed upon philosophy of science, associationism, structuralism, functionalism, behaviorism, gestalt, psycho- analysis, and recent psychological theories, including existentialism.
